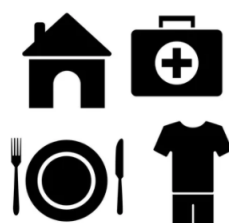

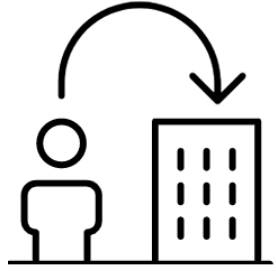

Applications must be filled out onsite only

Must Bring - Valid Driver License/ID, Current Lease or Mortgage Statement, Current Utility Bill, Birth Certificates for ALL children, Last three paycheck stubs, Social Security cards for everyone and wage statement for everyone receiving SSI/SSDI. If currently unemployed a WorkOne waiver will be provided.





Housing Assistance



1. Apply for Emergency Rental Assistance from IndyRent.org ASAP. IMPORTANT: if the program is closed when you visit the page, be sure to add your name and information to the waiting list. Visit www.IndyRent.org, call 317-912-1260, or stop by your local community center (John Boner Center, CAFE, etc.).

2. Consider utilizing the Indiana Supreme Court's free Landlord and Tenant Settlement Conference Program a fast-track way to help landlords and tenants talk about their situation with the help of a 'facilitator', a neutral helper, to see if a settlement can be reached before or after an eviction case is filed. Either party can initiate a request. If you make a request to participate in this program, keep a copy of your request to show to court officials.

3. Know your legal rights and right to seek assistance. Here are several free resources:

4. Above all else, be sure to show up on your court date! There will be in-person assistance available. If parties fail to appear in court, they may lose their case by default. IMPORTANT: Bring a copy of the IndyRent.org application I.D. number to court. Parties can check the status of their IndyRent application on the website.

5. Housing Discrimination: Tenants - If you feel housing discrimination has played a role in your treatment, please contact the Fair Housing Center of Central Indiana (FHCCI) at 317-644-0673 or info@fhcci.org or www.fhcci.org. The FHCCI is also interested in hearing from people who are rejected in their housing search due to the presence of an eviction or criminal history during tenant screening/background checks.
